# Workshops will be delivered by;

#### **Dr Keith Grimes**

Dr Grimes is Clinical Innovation Direction at Babylon Health, and a GP with nearly 20 years of experience at the front line of Primary Care. A keen advocate of the power of technology to deliver widespread quality improvement, he has experience of delivering award winning Digital Medicine projects, as well as pioneering work in Clinical Immersive Technology, and Artificial Intelligence. He is an expert panellist on the Topol Review, an independent report on preparing the healthcare workforce to deliver the digital future, and lead of the Babylon Clinical AI Fellow Programme.

### Dr Mohamed Al-Ubaydii

Mohammad is founder and CEO of Patients Know Best, the world's first patient-controlled health information system. He trained as a physician at the University of Cambridge; worked as a staff scientist at the National Institutes of Health; and was a management consultant to US hospitals at The Advisory Board Company. Mohammad is the author of seven books, *including* Personal health records: A guide for clinicians *and* Streamlining Hospital-Patient Communication: Developing High Impact Patient Portals. He is also an honorary senior research associate at UCL medical school for his research on patient-controlled medical records. In 2012 he was elected an Ashoka Fellow as a social entrepreneur for the contributions he has made to patient care. He will e running two workshops, one on the Future of Medical Education and one on the Future Work Climate focussing on how technology will radically change the way we work and educate and train our trainees.

### **Robin Miller**

Robin is deputy director of the Health Services Management Centre at the University of Birmingham. He leads on a variety of applied research projects within health and care, with a particular focus on evaluating and learning from change initiatives. Current projects include local evaluations of new models of care programme, the national longer-term evaluation of the Integrated Care Pioneers, and the evaluation of the Building the Right Support programme. Robin is the current Joint Editor in Chief of the International Journal of Integrated Care and Co-Editor of the Journal of Integrated Care. Robin will be leading a workshop presenting the challenges we face in education and training with the changing landscape of service delivery and the greater integration of community, primary and secondary care.

She has been involved in advising on curriculum reform, faculty development and leadership development in nurse education in the UK, South Africa, China, the Middle East, India and the Caribbean. Stacy will be leading a workshop on reverse mentoring. This is a mentoring technique used increasingly in top performing companies with immense potential in the NHS.
